

Camp Jubilee Packing List

While your child is at camp they will be participating in outdoor activities, many of which will require them to get wet and potentially messy. Please mark your child's belongings as we cannot be responsible for lost items.

As a Christian camp we want to promote modesty; therefore, campers should only bring appropriate clothing. Your camper should not bring any of the following clothing to camp: pajamas worn outside of cabins, halter tops, tube tops, shirts with spaghetti straps, boxer underwear worn as shorts, sports bras worn without a t-shirt, two-piece bathing suits, cheerleader shorts rolled down, and clothing advertising alcohol or smoking. Campers who are not appropriately dressed will be required to change their outfit.

All campers & buddies should bring the following items.

- o Bible
- Lightweight sleeping bag (or sheets & blanket), and pillow
- o Raincoat
- o Laundry Bag / Plastic bag for wet and dirty clothes
- Labeled informal camp clothes (please make sure that these are appropriate see above)
- o Clothes to sleep in
- o Towels
- o Toiletries
- One piece bathing suit
- One other pair of lace-up shoes
- o Old clothes & One pair of old, lace-up shoes that you don't mind getting messy
- Water shoes for the lake
- Hat/Cap
- Sunglasses
- Insect Repellent
- o Sunscreen
- 2 Water bottles (labeled with your name)

Optional

- o Towel or lawn chair to sit on during campfire
- Disposable Camera (labeled with your name)
- Foam sleeping pad for additional comfort in bed!
- Notebook
- Money (CASH ONLY) to purchase items from giftshop (will be open at check-in).

What not to bring

No food, candy, or beverages (other than water) are allowed in cabins. Knives, fireworks, weapons, drugs, alcohol, tobacco products and electronic cigarettes are banned. Students who are found with these will be sent home. Also, please leave cell phones, smart watches (and other electronics), skateboards, inappropriate magazines or books, and expensive cameras/clothing/jewelry at home. We encourage buddies to leave their cell phones in their cars to unplug and fully engage with their campers.
